1959 Graduated from Gadsden High School, Anthony, New Mexico.

1959 - 1963 Attended Western New Mexico University, Silver City, New Mexico. Obtained BA Degree in Education and Industrial Arts.

1963 - 1964 Graduate study in Guidance & Counseling.

Note: While employed by the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) I completed many in-service courses. Among these were: Wharton School of Business, PA; Aspen Institute Criminal Justice seminar, Aspen, CO; F.B.I. Academy training for hostage negotiations and news media relations, Quantico, VA.

EMPLOYMENT: FEDERAL BUREAU OF PRISONS

1964 - 1971 After a brief tour of duty at the Tucson Federal Prison Camp, Tucson, Arizona (which was primarily orientation) I transferred to F.C.I. La Tuna in Anthony, Texas as Recreation Specialist, a position I held for four years. Other positions included one year as teacher and two years as caseworker (social worker).

1971 - 1974 Received a promotion to BOP Central Office, Washington, D.C. as Correctional Program Specialist. My duties included being responsible for processing all correspondence addressed to the Assistant Director of Correctional Programs. This included congressional replies and other agency responses. In 1973, prior to regionalization, I became Chief of Case Manage-

ment. My duties included the overseeing of a nationwide program for classification and designation of all BOP inmates. The BOP at that time consisted of approximately 32 institutions.

1974 - 1976 Appointed Warden of a new generation of jails within the BOP, the Metropolitan Correctional Center in San Diego, California. As Warden, I was able to implement new programs such as the pre-portioned food microwave program and the automated computerized booking system (SENTRY). Both programs were later adopted nationwide by the BOP.

Due to the clientele at the Center, I was called upon to handle delicate issues concerning the community and news media.

1976 - 1977 Named Warden at Terre Haute Federal Penitentiary, Terre Haute, Indiana. My duties included the directing of a staff of 400, overseeing 1,200 inmates inside the maximum security institution and a 500-inmate minimum security camp.

1977 - 1981 Became Assistant Director, Correctional Programs Division, Central Office, Washington, D.C.

In this capacity I was directly responsible for eight disciplines:
CASE MANAGEMENT - classification and designation, inmate monitoring, unit management;
CORRECTIONAL SERVICES - custody and security, prisoner transportation;
PERSONNEL - pay and position management, labor management relations, EEO, examining and staffing, program development analysis and evaluation, central office personnel;
STAFF TRAINING; COMMUNITY PROGRAMS;
PSYCHOLOGY SERVICES; CHAPLAINCY SERVICES;
and EDUCATION

As Assistant Director I was a member of the Executive Staff, which required helping to develop policies and procedures and monitor the overall operations of the BOP.

I was chairman of the Classification/ Designation system now used in the Federal Prison system and other states and foreign countries.

My duties included being called upon to act as Director during his absence. This entailed such duties as congressional hearings, Attorney General staff meetings, speaking engagements, etc.

1981 - 1989

After four years of heavy traveling, and upon the retirement of the South Central Regional Director in Dallas, Texas, I requested and was approved for a lateral transfer to this position. This move afforded me the opportunity to spend more time with my daughter and son.

As Regional Director I continued to serve on the Executive Staff. In this capacity I supervised the management and operations of 11 institutions within my region and was responsible for a budget of \$90.1 million and 1,867 positions. My immediate staff at the region numbered 62 positions.

On November 21, 1987, approximately, 1,000 Cuban detainees housed at Oakdale, Louisiana rioted and took 37 staff members hostage. This seige was one of the most serious and devastating in the history of the BOP. Because Oakdale was in my region I was the commanding officer on site and responsible for the negotiations and coordination of all 300 BOP staff and 700 support staff from other agencies present (i.e., F.B.I., U.S. Marshals Service, Border Patrol, I.N.S., Louisiana National Guard, State Police and Sheriff's Task Force, local police and medical evacuation teams). A successful conclusion was reached with the safe release of all hostages on November 30, 1987.

1989 - 1990

In preparation for retirement I requested a transfer to F.C.I. La Tuna as Warden, and retired on March 3, 1990 after 25 years of service.
